Antitrust statement

The fundamental principles of the ISCOs include strict respect for, and compliance with, all relevant national and international laws and conventions, particularly compliance with current antitrust regulations under European and national competition law.

In order to ensure compliance with antitrust law, sensitive business information must not be discussed. Nor must there be any agreements regarding prices, sales control, production volumes, market sharing, boycott calls and/or calls for non-cooperation with third parties, regardless of the reasons for such agreements.

As a consequence, there must be no discussion of current or future prices, profit margins, discounts, the timing and level of envisaged price increases, costs, capacities, customers, suppliers, product or marketing plans, sales forecasts, borrowing terms or any other information that is sensitive from an antitrust point of view.

The discussion and exchange of information that is relevant in terms of competition is not only prohibited during sessions but also during informal conversations at which competitors are present.







Digital Integration of Agricultural Supply Chains Alliance (DIASCA)

DIASCA is developing **common open standards to support interoperability between traceability systems** in order to support:

- Compatibility between different systems, leading to far more efficient data exchange along agricultural supply chains;
- Greater efficiency of data collection at origin by making data comparable and (re-)useable for a variety of purposes;
- Freedom of choice and improved access to digital solutions for all supply chain actors;
- Participation of smallholder organisations in the benefits of due diligence legislation;
- Higher incomes for smallholders due to greater transparency in agricultural supply chains.



AIMS OF CHIS

- To develop a harmonized, gender disaggregated and globally applicable open-source methodology to measure the total household income of cocoa farming families.
- To provide relevant, comparable, quality, representative, fact-based and commonly-owned **baseline evidence** on cocoa farming household incomes.
- To evaluate the impact of private and public-private interventions on income different types of households, such that they can be used for evidence-based policy and intervention design, in order to enable living income gaps to be reduced and closed.
- To share information and evidence with households for decision making support on farm management and income generation.

PHASED APPROACH

- 5 phases Phases 1 & 2 committed for Côte d'Ivoire
- Phase I: Development of Standard Methodology fully funded by WCF members
- Phase II: Baseline Study Implementation seeking co-funding partners
- Phase III-V: Impact studies



WHAT CAN THE COCOA HOUSEHOLD INCOME STUDY DELIVER & FOR WHOM?

- Harmonized & complete sector wide data and information
 - For better learning, strategy development and more impact
- Open source data and information -while protecting the interests of data owners and households
 - A different model for dealing with data, ownership & participation to optimize learning and impact
 - Much more data and information to be available than currently
- Learning workshops and information to feed learning processes including for farming households

WHY? NEED FOR A HARMONIZED APPROACH FOR DATA COLLECTION, AND AVAILABLE EVIDENCE AT SCALE

To feed strategy and policy design to enable all households to earn a living income

As often, data collected is:

- Not available for parties other than the data owners and processors
- Not representative of the entire sector, and not comparable
- Generally does not include accurate information on cost of production and income from non cocoa sources
- Not specific enough for evaluations or policy design by public and private actors, NGOs/CSOs or platform organisations
